Angela Chui '12

■ The swimmer has broken four school records in individual events in the first three meets of her collegiate career, two of which came during a meet last Wednesday against Boston College.

In just the first three swim meets of her collegiate career, women's swimming and diving team member Angela Chui '12 has already broken school records in individual events four times.

Most recently, Chui broke her own record in the 100-yard backstroke event in a meet against Keene State College last Saturday.

"I was ... really surprised to have ... broken the [100-yard backstroke] record that many times," Chui said. "But ... [last Saturday] I knew I was up against someone really good, so I was really ... determined that I wanted to beat her. I wasn't like aiming to break another record, but it was really surprising for me as well."

Chui initially broke the 100-yard backstroke record leading off the 400-yard medley relay in the Michael Zarrilli Invitational Oct. 18. She then broke her own record at last Wednesday's meet against Boston College before breaking it once again last Saturday with a time of 1 minute, 0.84 seconds.

She also broke the school's 200-yard backstroke record, set by Sharon Makowsky '06 in 2006, against Boston College. Chui's time of 2:09.90 was less than a second slower than the NCAA Division III Championship B standard. Chui said meeting the NCAA standard is her goal for the season.

"That's like my main goal ... to make a B or an A cut," Chui said.

Chui said she would like to post her best times this year but emphasized team-oriented goals as well.

"I'd really like to swim ... all my best times, but I'd really like for our team

wins to be ... more than last year and try to see if we can beat the teams that we lost to last year," she said.

Men's Soccer vs. Emory University

The Judges will return to University Athletic Association play Friday at 7:30 p.m.

Returning to conference play after a one-game hiatus, the men's soccer team will face No. 6 Emory University.

Having snapped a seven-game winless streak last Wednesday with a 2-0 victory over Springfield College, the Judges will look to become the first team to beat the Eagles this season. The Eagles have a 14-0-0 overall record and are 4-0-0

against UAA opponents.

Last season, the Judges lost a 4-0 contest at Emory, who scored two goals in each half.

Friday night's contest will be the first of two conference matchups for the Judges this weekend. Brandeis will take on Carnegie Mellon University next Sunday.

Johnson so-so, but defense helps Cowboys beat Bucs

IRVING, Texas (AP)—Brad Johnson didn't mind the boos. He gladly traded them for a victory.

In his second start subbing for the injured Tony Romo, Johnson repeatedly threw passes that probably wouldn't get first downs but also likely wouldn't be intercepted. His safety-first approach annoyed the home fans, until the Dallas Cowboys walked away 13-9 winners over the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sunday.

Johnson passed for a measly 122 yards, and the Cowboys gained only 172, their fewest ever in a victory. His aim was off on several potential scores, but he came through on a two-yard touchdown pass to newcomer Roy Williams just before halftime that proved to be the game-winner.

Fittingly, it capped a drive sustained by four Tampa Bay penalties.

"We knew going in it was going to be an ugly game at times," Johnson said. "Third-and-long, check it down, let them boo you, that's OK by me. ... You've just got to manage the game."

Considering Dallas had lost two straight games and three of the last four, the Cowboys (5-3) were happy for any kind of win.

More significant for coach Wade Phillips was the defense giving up its fewest points all season. Phillips took a more active role this week, including telling coordinator Brian Stewart which plays to run.

"I just thought if I got more involved, it would help," Phillips said.

Sure did. Tampa Bay (5-3) got only three field goals, two coming in the first quarter after drives that reached the Dallas 18 and 14.

In the game's final minute, the Bucs were driving for a potential go-ahead score when they faced fourth-and-five from the 18 with 19 seconds left. Under heavy pressure, Jeff Garcia threw an incompletion. As the Cowboys ran around celebrating, offensive lineman Jeremy Trueblood threw his helmet in frustration.

"It was lost in the first half," said Garcia, who was 28-of-44 for 228 yards. "We had them on their heels. There were some great drives and we didn't execute. Those missed opportunities ended up haunting us."

Also haunting Tampa Bay will be the penalties, especially on Dallas' lone touchdown drive.

The Cowboys were stopped on two third downs, but kept the ball because of a horse-collar tackle, then a pass interference. Next came a flag for illegal contact and an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty for linebacker Cato June punching Dallas offensive lineman Marc Colombo.

After all that, the Cowboys had six seconds left and risked time running out by trying one more play. Johnson threw high and Williams used his four-inch height advantage over cornerback Phillip Buchanon to snag it.

Faulk's TD with 3:13 left gives Pats 23-16 win

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. (AP)—Short-handed but sure-handed, the New England Patriots grabbed another win.

Kevin Faulk grasped a 15-yard touchdown pass just inbounds with three minutes, 13 seconds left, holding onto the ball despite being hit by St. Louis linebacker Pisa Tinoisamoa, and the Patriots had their go-ahead touchdown.

Deltha O'Neal pulled in another ball on a juggling interception with 1:08 remaining, and the Patriots rallied for a 23-16 win Sunday.

Inconsistent most of the day without three sidelined running backs, the Patriots (5-2) held on when it mattered most, winning a tight game six days after routing Denver 41-7. The Rams (2-5) played without injured runner Steven Jackson and lost for the first time since Jim Haslett succeeded the fired Scott Linehan after an 0-4 start.

"We're behind in the fourth quarter, and it was up to us to come back in the face of a little adversity," quarterback Matt Cassel said. "There's going to be, I'm sure, a lot of [tight games] down the road."

And, barring still another injury to a depleted backfield, Faulk will be there to help.

In his 10th season, all with the Patriots, Faulk has come through in many roles—runner, receiver, returner and old reliable.

The Patriots' best pass-catching running back held onto Cassel's TD pass on the left edge of the end zone. Two receptions by Randy Moss gained 26 yards and set up the winning touchdown.

"That's something I learned from Randy," Faulk said, "not sticking your hands out early, letting the ball come to you, right in the breadbasket."

Faulk shouldered a bigger running load than usual with Laurence Maroney out for the season and the top two backups in the ground game, Sammy Morris and LaMont Jordan, sidelined. But Faulk did what he does best—catch the ball, just in time.

Until then, St. Louis' Josh Brown and New England's Stephen Gostkowski each kicked three field goals. Ben Jarvis Green-Ellis' two-yard run on the Patriots' first possession had given them a 7-3 lead. Then the Rams went ahead 10-7 on a 69-yard pass play from Marc Bulger to Donnie Avery.

The 69-yarder was the longest pass play of Bulger's career, two yards more than his hookup with Torry Holt on Oct. 15, 2006, against Seattle.

The Rams couldn't overcome the absence of Jackson, their leading rusher and receiver who missed the game with a strained right thigh muscle. And defensive end Leonard Little left in the first half with a hamstring injury.

The winning drive began at the Patriots 47 after a punt. Cassel was sacked for an eight-yard loss by rookie Chris Long on the first play. But then he connected with Moss for gains of 23 and three yards before a seven-yard run by Faulk gave the Patriots a first down at the Rams 28.

Cassel threw an eight-yard completion to Moss, and Faulk ran five yards before Cassel lofted the winning throw into Faulk's hands.

"We knew we had to play perfect, and we didn't play perfect," Tinoisamoa said. "Cassel made a great throw. Faulk made a great catch."
