Belichick fined \$500,000, Patriots lose draft picks in cheating scandal

NEW YORK—Bill Belichick should be able to read this signal clearly:

Spy on your opponents, and it will cost you. The New England coach was fined the NFL maximum of \$500,000 Thursday and the Patriots were ordered to pay \$250,000 for stealing an opponent's defensive signals.

Commissioner Roger Goodell also ordered the team to give up next year's first-round draft choice if it reaches the playoffs and second- and third-round picks if it doesn't.

The videotaping came to light after a camera was confiscated from Patriots video assistant Matt Estrella while he was on the New York Jets' sideline during New England's 38-14 win last Sunday at Giants Stadium.

The NFL said the camera was seized before the end of the first quarter and had no impact on the game.

"This episode represents a calculated and deliberate attempt to avoid long-standing rules designed to encourage fair play and promote honest competition on the playing field," Goodell said in a letter to the Patriots.

He said he considered suspending Belichick but didn't "largely because I believe that the discipline I am imposing of a maximum fine and forfeiture of a first-round draft choice, or multiple draft choices, is in fact more significant and long-lasting, and therefore more effective, than a suspension."

Goodell's hard line on discipline has been aimed so far at players—most notably Michael Vick and Adam "Pacman" Jones.

By penalizing a coach and a team he showed that no one, not even management, was immune.

Reached at his home, Patriots owner Robert Kraft declined to comment.

The New York Jets said, "We support the commissioner and his findings."

If the Patriots lose their first-rounder next season they still will have a first-round pick, obtained from San Francisco in the deal that brought wide receiver Randy Moss from Oakland.

NFL rules state "no video recording devices of any kind are permitted to be in use in the coaches' booth, on the field, or in the locker room during the game." They also say all video for coaching purposes must be shot from locations "enclosed on all sides with a roof overhead."

Ryan leads No. 21 Boston College to upset of No. 15 Georgia Tech

ATLANTA—Matt Ryan, get ready for some Heisman hype. The Boston College quarterback was the clear winner in a showdown with another of the country's top players, throwing for a career-best 435 yards to lead the 21st-ranked Eagles to a 24-10 victory over No. 15 Georgia Tech Saturday night.

Ryan's previous best was a 408-yard effort two weeks ago against defending Atlantic Coast Conference champion Wake Forest. He's now just shy of 1,000 yards for the season after only three games.

"We came in expecting to move the ball pretty well," Ryan said. "We had confidence."

With good reason. Ryan was 30-of-44 in the third 400-yard passing game of his career, which included a 39-yard touchdown pass to Brandon Robinson. The Yellow Jackets were clearly impressed.

"We haven't seen a quarterback like that since Brady Quinn," Georgia Tech safety Pat Clark said. "He's real confident. He's real comfortable in the pocket. He made plays when he had to. That's what good quarterbacks do."

L.V. Whitworth had a pair of touchdown runs for Boston College (3-0), which has beaten three straight ACC opponents to take early control of the league race.

The Yellow Jackets (2-1, 0-1 ACC) reached the league championship game a year ago, but they'll have to dig out of an early hole if they want to get back to Jacksonville. They were totally outclassed by Boston College, which piled up 527 yards and allowed just 267.

"Matt's maturity level is as good as any quarterback I've been around," Jeff Jagodzinski, Boston College's first-year coach, said. "The game slows down for him. He doesn't get rattled about anything he does. I'm sure glad I've got him."

Woods routs field by eight shots at inaugural FedEx Cup Championship

ATLANTA—This new era in golf sure had a familiar ending. Tiger Woods never paid much attention to the FedEx Cup until it was shining before him on a pedestal on the 18th green Sunday at East Lake. He always figured his name would be the first engraved on the new trophy as long as he kept winning.

And there was never a doubt. In his final event of another spectacular season, Woods closed with a four-under 66 to shatter the tournament record and win the Tour Championship by eight shots for his second straight victory in these PGA Tour Playoffs.

The only new twist? It was the first time Woods won two trophies at one tournament.

Along with earning \$1.26 million in cash for winning the Tour Championship for his seventh PGA Tour title of the year, Woods was a runaway winner of the FedEx Cup and the \$10 million that goes into a retirement account.

"I don't look at what the purse is or the prize money," Woods said. "You play. And when you play, you play to win, period. That's how my dad raised me, is you go out there and win. If you win, everything will take care of itself. You take great pride in what you do on the golf course."

If this was supposed to be golf's version of the Super Bowl, Woods spent most of the final round taking a knee.

The only drama was whether he would break the 72-hole scoring record on the PGA Tour. With a late bogey, Woods had to settle for a 23-under 257, the lowest of his career, breaking the Tour Championship record by six shots.

Masters champion Zach Johnson (68) and Mark Calcavecchia (71) tied for second.

"The man is a freak of nature," Johnson said of Woods. "It just makes it harder for the rest of us. Why give him another thing to try to achieve?"

Sofia Vallone '11

■ The rookie midfielder came off the bench to score goals in each of the women's soccer team's two games this week.

Sofia Vallone's '11 rookie season did not get off to an optimal start. She tore her hamstring just three weeks before the end of the preseason and was only cleared to start practicing two days before the start of the season.

"It was definitely the exact opposite of how I wanted my season to start, but I'm glad that I'm still coming in and getting done what I wanted to do," Vallone said. "It kind of left me a little behind everyone, so I have a lot of ground to make up."

In just five games, Vallone has already made up that ground. She scored goals in both games this week, a 2-0 victory over Bridgewater State College Wednesday and a 1-1 tie against Clark University Saturday, and she is still euphoric a few days later.

"It actually kind of feels like a dream because I'm a freshman, and definitely at the college level you really don't expect to make that much of an impact right away and be able

to help the team," she said.

Making an impression was harder for Vallone than most, due to her injury and the presence of 10 other rookies on the roster, but she said she was able to overcome that transition.

"In the first practice, they told us it doesn't matter how old you are, it doesn't matter your history on the team, the best players will play, and I think that that kind of made all the freshmen sort of relax and know that they'll get their fair chance," she said.

Nevertheless, Vallone, whose four points place her fourth on the team behind starters Sarah Jasak '08, Melissa Gorenkoff '09 and Tiffany Pacheco '11, has not let anything get in the way of pursuing her soccer ambitions thus far.

"I saw my first college game when I was 10, and ever since, it's been my dream to really play in college," Vallone said.
