Georgia drops College World Series to Cinderella squad

OMAHA, Neb. — Cinderella finally found her glass slipper Wednesday night.

After losing Game 1 of the College World Series Championship Series to Georgia,

Fresno State took Games 2 and 3 to become the most unlikely champion in CWS history.

And after winning its first four games in Omaha, Georgia fell short in two straight to go home ring-less.

"True champions," Georgia head coach David Perno said of

Fresno State's 6-1 win Wednesday. "They did it the hard way."

Down 6-3 in Game 1, Georgia

rallied behind an eighth-inning home run by All-American short-stop Gordon Beckham and a game-winning hit by Joey Lewis. But Fresno State responded in Game 2, a 19-10 rout.

After Fresno State pitched largely by committee in the first two games, Game 3 meant it

had No. 1 starter Justin Wilson back on three days rest. He dominated the Athens version of the Bulldogs, striking out nine and allowing only one run and five hits over eight innings, the longest outing for any pitcher

Journalism school buys TV station for cohorts

A local television station is coming to the University near you.

The University of Georgia Research Foundation and Grady College of Journalism and Mass Communication announced the acquisition of WNEG-TV, channel 32, from owner Media General, Inc., according to a University news release.

"It is but a sketch on a canvas that all in the college are invited to paint," Grady College Dean E. Culpepper Clark said to the college's faculty and staff in an e-mail Wednesday.

The station serves northeast Georgia from studios in Toccoa, and the license will be transferred at closing on October 15.

The station will produce local programming, featuring University academic, cultural and athletic events, according to the release.

"The acquisition of WNEG is the foundation for development of a Center for Advanced Media, out of which the University plans to distribute its rich content statewide through multiple

Humphrey arrested on DUI charge

Georgia men's basketball player Billy Humphrey was arrested Tuesday morning in Gwinnett County, marking the third time in less than a year the point guard has run afoul of the law.

Humphrey was arrested and charged with DUI, failure to maintain lane and purchasing alcohol while under 21 years old. He was booked at the

Gwinnett County Jail at 3:32 a.m.

Humphrey registered a .02 blood alcohol content, the limit for under 21.

Humphrey was arrested in Athens in January and charged with underage possession and failure to obey a traffic device, blowing a .03 at that incident. He was suspended for three games following that incident, but the recent arrest could mean more time.

Athletic Association rules dictate a second violation of alcohol rules results

in suspension from 50 percent of regular-season games, which means up to 15 games in Humphrey's case.

Tuesday's arrest comes on the heels of his arrest and felony charge with possession of a weapon on school property in November. University police found a butterfly knife in his East Campus dorm. He was required to perform 80 hours of community service, was put on probation for 18 months and was told to stay out of trouble.

Ala. duo 'highly unpredictable'

BoomBox is a duo that hails from Muscle Shoals, Ala., an unassuming Southern town that's produced artists such as Aretha Franklin, Bob Dylan, Paul Simon and The Rolling Stones. With such a diverse and rich musical history, Muscle Shoals was the perfect breeding ground for a band like BoomBox.

With all these hometown influences on tap, singer/songwriter/guitarist Zion Godchaux and "sound magician"/disc jockey Russ Randolph have managed to craft a dangerous, genre-spanning sonic palette of hypnotic dance rhythms; laid-back, psychedelic funk; jazz-influenced, hip-hop percussion and pretty much everything else under the sun. And they do it all live.

"It was in the stars, meeting Russ," Godchaux said. "During shows, I understand what Russ is doing, and he understands what

I'm doing — it's like we share a brain."

Godchaux is the showman of the group, with a natural stage presence that runs in the family. Both his parents were minor members of The Grateful Dead, and following in their footsteps, BoomBox shows can be highly unpredictable, exploring different combinations of sounds and textures at a moment's notice.

It is this spontaneity and experimentation that gives the group's live show an added touch of suspense and excitement. Bands like Phish and The Grateful Dead had such devoted and large fan bases for so long because of
